- **The ad claims to be on behalf of the "late Ezekiah Hopkins, of Lebanon, Pennsylvania"** (League.29).
- This Ezekiah Hopkins is supposed to have left a "bequest" (read: an amount of money in his will) to the "Red-Headed League," which has a vacancy for a healthy red-haired guy over 21 years of age, to collect a weekly salary of four pounds for light duties. Using the calculator we mentioned in *A Scandal in Bohemia's* detailed summary, this would be about 315 pounds per week in today's money, or U.S. \$515.
